- ✓ Remove and rinse after meals.
- ✓ Brush daily using a soft denture brush.
- ✓ Use liquid soap or a denture cleanser designed for metal dentures.
- ✓ Brush your remaining teeth, gums, and tongue.
- ✓ Store the denture safely when not in use.
- ✓ Visit your dentist regularly to check the fit.

Don't:

- ✗ Don't use regular toothpaste (it's abrasive).
- ✗ Don't soak in bleach or chlorine-containing cleaners.
- ✗ Don't use boiling or very hot water.
- ✗ Don't bend the metal clasps yourself.
- ✗ Don't ignore a loose or uncomfortable denture—see your dentist for adjustment.
